### *The Healing Jesus*

Joel speaks for all of us. OK, well, most of us. Certainly anyone who's struggled with insomnia resonates with Job's being "filled with restlessness until the dawn." But most of us share with Job the experience of suffering. Some people have suffered beyond comprehension; others have known only "regular" suffering—illness, death, disability, tragedy—although it's never regular when it happens to us. We've all felt the frightening despair of which Job speaks. Some fortunate souls haven't experienced such challenges. During a talk I gave several years ago, I asked the audience to recall their own suffering. An older couple admitted they hadn't experienced significant suffering. Their children were healthy, their parents died at a ripe old age, and life had been fairly easy for them. This isn't the experience of most of us, however. Even if we've moved past

such moments of pain and suffering, we can recall feeling as Job did—that life was misery, that hope was difficult to find. There certainly are no easy solutions to the problem of suffering. But in the Gospel today, we see Jesus in his healing ministry, reaching out to so many in need. Aren't we, in our times of suffering, among the crowds gathered at Jesus' door, begging for healing and mercy? Jesus is persistent in his healing—he doesn't let exhaustion or weariness stop him. He reaches out, grasps hands, and is present to those who are hurting. Jesus is this persistent presence of healing to us too. He sees us in the crowd, he grasps our hand, and he promises to stay with us always.

## EVALUATING HOLY MATRIMONY AFTER DIVORCE - (Prepared by Fr. Howard Hall and Fr. Paul Counce, Tribunal Office)

The Catholic Church, following upon both the words of Jesus and its own Sacred Tradition, has always seen marriage as a holy and permanent institution. Whenever two baptized persons contract marriage in a lawful way, it is then presumed to be a sacred and permanent (until death) *sacrament*. Even when one who is not baptized contracts marriage properly, a permanent (until death) relationship is presumed to arise. Therefore, when any marriage (sacrament or not) breaks down, the spouses are not automatically free to marry again. True, what is presumed to be permanent *may* actually have been defective in some way. If this happens, we understand the apparent marriage to have been real but *invalid*. For this reason someone who has been previously married - whose spouse is still living - must seek to have freedom to marry again verified by the Church before considering that new marriage. The Tribunal offices of the Church do this determination. While these processes of evaluation are very thorough and may possibly take a long time, Father Bob, another local priest, or a deacon will be happy to assist you in getting started with it.

### **It sounds complicated!**

Maybe. Some cases are very simple, and can be verified quickly. For example, when a Catholic attempts marriage improperly before a civil official or non-Catholic minister, this kind of "Lack of Form" case takes only a few days to finalize. However, most "formal cases" take a year-and-a-half or even more to process. Trained priests, deacons, and lay ministers work with you to make it as simple as possible. Each of these persons seek to be very pastoral and understanding as they help you gather basic information, fill out a formal "petition," and write out a simple story of your dating, engagement, wedding and married life. To be honest, many people find this kind of orderly review of the facts to bring a sense of relief and personal closure to their experience. The sooner this is completed, the sooner the process can begin.

### **I've heard it's expensive!**

Definitely not. No one is ever refused the service of the Church because of an inability to pay! Sure, the Church has expenses (secretarial costs, telephone and postage fees, staff salaries, etc.). To make up at least a part of this, the person who applies is asked to give a \$50 filing fee "up front." Additional costs are requested, too (to a maximum of \$450), but these are only due at the end of the process. If financial difficulties are present, you may request a reduction, or even a complete waiver, of all of these fees.

### **Isn't this "Catholic divorce"?**

No. The Church has no power to dissolve a true and valid sacramental marriage. In fact, nobody does. Civil divorce only ends a "legal" relationship; it does not change any *spiritual* realities. If the Church finds that an apparent marriage actually was invalid (also call "null"), however, this means that there actually is no binding *spiritual* obligation between the parties. A Church declaration of nullity doesn't *change* anything: it only declares what has been found by a careful look at the people involved and the content of their wedding commitment to each other. Many things can prevent an apparently fine marriage from being valid: misguided intentions, psychological problems, errors of understanding and commitment, etc. This can happen even if the couple's life together lasted for years and produced children. Sometimes problems are easy to identify, sometimes not. The crucial issue is proving that there was some defect present from the very beginning, from the time the couple vowed their commitment to each other at the wedding.

### **What about the children?**

This does not affect them at all. Laws of the State, not the Church, determine the legitimacy and inheritance rights of children. In fact, both the State and the Church recognize children of divorced parents as legitimate. If the Church Tribunal finds that the parents' failed marriage was not valid also, this does not change the status of the children.

### **Does this apply to non-Catholics?**

Yes. The Catholic Church respects the sacredness of the unions of Protestants and others who contract marriage. If properly done, those marriages, too, must be considered permanent commitments, until death. Thus, a divorced non-Catholic is not automatically free to marry a Catholic. In reality, however, marriages of non-Catholics can be invalid due to the same kinds of serious flaws which affect Catholic unions. So, the priests, deacons, ministers and Tribunals of the Church stand ready to assist with the evaluations of non-Catholic marriages as well. Consultation should also be made over previous marriage to the non-baptized seeking to marry a Catholic.

### **When should an annulment be requested?**

Generally, the sooner the better. True, simply being divorced is no problem. The single life-style is a noble and honorable one in the Church. Catholics who are divorced and remain single may - and should - receive communion and lead active lives of faith and stewardship. So, where there are no plans to marry again, there is technically no need to approach the Tribunal. Most people, however, do eventually wish to remarry. But if a Catholic attempts another marriage improperly (usually called "outside the Church") he or she may not receive the Eucharist. So - given that the Church's evaluative process is usually quite lengthy - it is advisable for divorced Catholics to petition for a Tribunal evaluation soon after the divorce, even if a new marriage is not "on the horizon" yet. The same is true when beginning to date a divorced person.

### **What about the previous spouse?**

The Church respects each person. The previous spouse has a right to know the truth and to take part in the Tribunal's evaluation, especially by providing testimony. If he or she refuses to take an active part - or if their whereabouts are entirely unknown - a case can still move ahead, although this makes the Tribunal's work much more difficult.

### **How is proof of invalidity obtained?**

The parties will be asked to name several witnesses who knew the couple at the time of the marriage and are willing to answer a questionnaire. The Church's judge also consults with a priest known as the "defender of the bond," who points out weaknesses in the case. Each party also testifies, separately, not only in writing, but also at a private conference with the Church's judge. A priest, deacon, or other lay minister serves as an Advocate to assist the parties at this time.

### **How long will it all take?**

There is no way to guarantee *any* time-frame. Every case is slowed down by a lack of response from someone. In most formal cases, if the parties and witnesses are prompt in responding, the local Diocesan Tribunal can usually complete its evaluation in a year or so. After the case is completed locally, the case usually must be reviewed by another Tribunal in another diocese. This additional process can take many months too. No new wedding can ever be scheduled by the Church until the entire evaluation is complete, nor can a wedding be celebrated until the final decree is issued. Finally, we must be honest and note that a significant number of requests for declarations of nullity ultimately are denied, because proof of invalidity is not established. I've got more questions. Then, please speak directly to someone who knows what they're talking about! The best thing to do at the very beginning is to call Msgr. Berggreen at 638-9665.
